2024 was a year of continued growth and transformation for our team and the communities we partner with. Together, we built nine new schools and served over 125,000 students - all in just one year.

While the team and I are thrilled at each new school built and student supported, what continues to stand out to me the most is simple: what we do works. Our longitudinal study in Ghana showed that reading fluency for students increased from 9% to 69% over the course of four years, while control schools went from 6% to 47% in the same time period. This means that when a student is enrolled in a PoP school, we can guarantee that their learning outcomes will increase. That is something that we can all be very, very proud of.

Embarking on 2025, I am ecstatic to be back with the PoP team in a day-to-day capacity, working to improve our programs, expand our reach and work toward a world where every child has access to quality education.

Thank you for being with us on this journey and staying committed to the vision of a better world through education. I hope you enjoy reflecting on the past year as much as I did.

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL) OUTCOMES



In a two-year observation study, 80% of teachers participating in PoP's SEL program reported improvements in student confidence, peer collaboration, and regular school attendance. These are key indicators of growth in self-awareness, social awareness, and relationship skills—three of the five core competencies outlined by the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL). These skills are foundational for student well-being and long-term academic engagement.

Classrooms implementing Morning Meeting activities experienced a notable increase in student participation: in the 2019–2020 school year, 90% of students were actively engaged in greeting and sharing activities. In contrast, data from the 2018–2019 school year showed that only 74% of students were participating. Morning Meetings provide a daily opportunity to connect, build trust, and create a sense of belonging—helping students and teachers start the day with purpose, and setting the tone for stronger engagement and learning.




LITERACY OUTCOMES

9 > 69%

For Upper Primary students in Ghana, PoP students showed fluency gains from 9% in 2018 to 69% in 2022, while control schools improved from 6% (2018) to 47% (2022). These results position PoP students far ahead of Ghana's 2025 national SDG benchmark goal of 52% proficiency at the end of primary school, demonstrating the long-term value of sustained literacy programming. (EGRA, 2018-2022).

Reading comprehension outcomes were equally compelling. In Lower Primary, PoP students improved from 0% to 45% between 2018 and 2022, compared to 0% to 29% in control schools. In Upper Primary, PoP students rose from 4% to 74%, while their peers in control schools increased from 3% to 59%. According to UNESCO, comprehension is a core element of SDG Target 4.1, and these outcomes suggest that PoP's model is enabling students to far exceed national targets for minimum reading proficiency. (EGRA, 2018-2022).

WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

Through our WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene) program, we provide children with access to clean water, private bathrooms and good hygiene practices to foster their growth and development. We believe providing safe, clean infrastructure, coupled with knowledge about hygiene behavior is essential for keeping kids healthy, happy and in school. Our WASH program is straightforward: Provide the infrastructure, distribute materials and educate students and communities on healthy behaviors.

IMPROVED ACCESS TO SAFE DRINKING WATER



In 2024, 96% of students in PoP WASH schools reported drinking from PoP-provided water filters, ensuring daily access to safe water at school. These results stand in stark contrast to global trends—according to UNICEF (2022), 546 million children worldwide attend schools that lack basic drinking water services.

STRENGTHENED HYGIENE PRACTICES

In Laos, 83% of students reported washing their hands after using the washroom. This behavior change matters because 42% of schools globally lack basic hygiene services, affecting 802 million children (UNICEF, 2022). Without these practices in place, students face an increased risk of illness and school absenteeism.




REDUCING STIGMA & EXPANDING AWARENESS FOR MENSTRUAL HEALTH

Menstrual health remains one of the most neglected components of school-based health interventions. Globally, over 500 million girls and women lack access to menstrual hygiene products and safe facilities (World Bank). Without intervention, stigma and misinformation lead to absenteeism and educational inequality.



In Guatemala, the percentage of students in PoP's WASH program who believed girls can attend school while on their period doubled from 40% to 82%. These shifts are critical, not only for keeping girls in school but for enabling them to thrive with confidence and dignity.





SCHOOL BUILDS

According to the latest data from the WHO/UNICEF Joint Monitoring Programme (2022):

29%

of schools lack basic drinking water services, affecting 546 million students.

28%

lack basic sanitation services, impacting 539 million students. 42%

do not have basic hygiene services, affecting 802 million students.

This highlights the urgent need for improved school infrastructure worldwide.

Across the globe, millions of children attend schools lacking basic infrastructure—no clean water, proper sanitation, or safe spaces to learn. These conditions hinder learning and limit future opportunities. At PoP, 85% of the school communities PoP visits across the globe lack basic physical infrastructure. We partner with communities to remove these barriers, transforming daily experiences for children and creating ripple effects that uplift generations. Together, with our build partners and supporters, we're not just building schools—we're building a better world.






WASH Infrastructure

In many of the communities PoP serves, students don't have access to safe, hygienic bathrooms or handwashing stations at school. Without these basic facilities, children often have to leave school during the day just to use the restroom at home—disrupting their learning and sometimes preventing them from returning at all.

That's why PoP builds private, gender-segregated bathrooms, installs handwashing stations, and provides clean water filters at schools. We also deliver essential hygiene education to students. Because we believe that safe, clean infrastructure—and the knowledge to use it—is critical to keeping children healthy, confident, and in class, where they belong.







CLASSROOM BUILDS


